### Welcome & Prayer

Good morning and welcome to our Christmas Day service at Charlestown Presbyterian. For the Christian, Christmas Day is typically a day for celebration so it is good perhaps to stop and pause and remember this even though it has been a difficult year and month. Some might even be asking what it is that we are celebrating? Well of course there is the birth of Jesus who would go on to be the Saviour for our sins. *Nevertheless, there will be no more gloom for those who were in distress. ## Pastoral Prayer

## Bible Reading – John 1:1-18 (NIV)

*"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. 2 He was with God in the beginning. 3 Through him all things were made; without him nothing was made that has been made. 4 In him was life, and that life was the light of all mankind. 5 The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it. 6 There was a man sent from God whose name was John. 7 He came as a witness to testify concerning that light, so that through him all might believe. 8 He himself was not the light; he came only as a witness to the light. 9 The true light that gives light to everyone was coming into the world. 10 He was in the world, and though the world was made through him, the world did not recognize him. 11 He came to that which was his own, but his own did not receive him. 12 Yet to all who did*

receive him, to those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God— 13 children born not of natural descent, nor of human decision or a husband's will, but born of God. 14 The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth. 15 (John testified concerning him. ## Sermon – A Quiet Revival (Stephen T)

Christmas in Australia is loud. Walk through Charlestown Square in December and you're hit with flashing lights, Mariah Carey on loop, crowds driving like it's the apocalypse, kids screaming in the Santa line, and trolleys crashing like dodgems. Even ducking into Woollies for milk feels like entering a Christmas theme park. Christmas is loud, crowded, chaotic. As if it is a bully wanting to push everyone and everything out of its way.

But the first Christmas? Well, there was no crowds. No music. No advertising. Just a manger. A stable. A silent night. A beam of light entering a dark world. This is God's way. Not entering the world with a big song and dance. But sending the world its first Christmas present in a way that God has often works in history. Doing his work of revival, renewal, restoration not through the high and mighty but through the small, the humble, the weak.

In Bethlehem we see that God's revival of his whole world begins quietly. It begins quietly in the hearts of a Mary & Joseph, before reaching out to some shepherds in the fields and later to some wise men from afar. And God continues to do his work of revival quietly even today.

During the year a number of small, & to our news cycle, insignificant reports, have come our way. From Scripture Union in Britain. Across university campuses in USA. In a small Christian denomination in France. Even here in Churches in Australia. What has been dubbed the Quiet Revival is slowly but surely gaining momentum. Young people, often young males aged 15-25, disillusioned with what the world around them

is offering them, are quietly returning to Church, seeking out more information about Jesus, embracing the Christian faith.

It's not new, even though for many of us here it looks new. There have been times like this in many places and at many times in the past. But all these revivals trace their roots back to the first Christmas. So, let's see what God did to bring about a quiet revival through the arrival of His Light in a really dark place as described by John 1:1–18 and Isaiah 9:1–7. Firstly, we see

### 1. The Dark Outside

John 1:5 — “*The light shines in the darkness...*” Isaiah 9:2 — “*The people walking in darkness have seen a great light.*” Both Isaiah and John begin with **realism**. Before there is Christmas joy, there is Christmas honesty. Isaiah describes people as living in *gloom*, carrying *burdens*, under *oppression* & surrounded by *thick darkness*.

John 600 years later, begins his gospel by describing the same sort of world, a world marked by sorrow, sin, and confusion. He says its due to people being spiritually blind, rejecting their Creator God, unable to understand or simply **not wanting to understand** the light of God that he had previously shed on the world.

Friends, the Christmas story, assumes the world is broken. It's not morally neutral, but darkened. And isn't that the world we look out on in 2025? A place where war and conflict grab the news headlines every day, where whole societies are turning on themselves and breaking down, where shootings and massacres of innocent people happen before our very eyes, where there are deep fractures in many of our families, anxiety is rising, loneliness is taking hold, cost of living pressures are beginning to bite and injustice and greed seems to be the order of the day.

Is that why we make Christmas so loud in Australia? To hide the silence that we are currently feeling? For silence reveals loneliness. It exposes sadness & brings our emptiness to the surface. Every December, chaplains, counsellors, and ministers say the same thing: Christmas amplifies whatever is already inside. Some Australians are celebrating loudly — because they're hiding something quietly. While others are removing themselves from these loud celebrations because they feel in their hearts there is nothing good to celebrate.

They miss loved ones who are no longer there. They don't want to join families that are openly dysfunctional. They're too tired or stressed to join in the Christmas merry go round. Either way Christmas often hides the darkness that many of us are feeling. But today I want to tell you that Jesus came to do something about this dark, dark world. He came because people were walking in the darkness & he came in a way that shines forth with God's light.

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### 2. The Light Inside

Here is the astonishing truth: Light does not come from the world. **Light breaks into the world.** Isaiah says: “**A great light has dawned.**” Not risen from within humanity — but dawned upon us from above. John writes: “**The true light... was coming into the world.**” So, light intrudes. Light invades. Light pursues. Light awakens. Christmas is not humanity reaching up to God. Christmas is God shining down into humanity with his wonderful light.

**So, what is the nature of this light?** According to John, the Light is **Life** (1:4) — spiritual vitality, renewal. The light is **Revealing** (1:5) — exposing truth, revealing God. It is **Universal** (1:9) — for all people. While still being **Personal** (1:12–13) — making us children of God.

The miracle of Christmas is not just that Light came into the world, but that the Light came as a person. Isaiah promises a child who will be a **Wonderful Counsellor**, one who will bring wisdom to us in the midst of our confusion. Who is **Mighty God**, who will bring with him the strength of the Lord Almighty and make it available to us in our weakness. This child is also described as an **Everlasting Father**, someone who will bring us a father's unconditional love, even to those whose own fathers didn't love them that way. And he will be called **the Prince of Peace** because he can bring us peace with God, peace with our neighbours, peace in our families, even peace within our hearts.

Then John tells us that "*The Word became flesh and made His dwelling among us.*" Meaning this person enters the world to live amongst us. To understand us. To save us from darkness. And that's what this quiet revival is all about. It isn't loud. There are no headlines. But it is real. Young people turning up to church who haven't been to Church before. Alpha courses running out of space. Interest in University ministries growing. Young men asking the hard questions and willing to wrestle with the hard answers that the Bible is giving to them.

It's not a cultural moment. It's not a program. It's not hype. It's light entering people. A quiet revival — one heart at a time. Maybe that's what happening this Christmas in you? You come to the Christmas services because your family makes you come but today something is stirring within you. Or maybe this is a new experience for you and you were willing to give up precious time this Christmas to scratch an itch that has been growing within you.

Or maybe you are already a Christian but this Christmas you are particularly tired or stressed or anxious. You need a quiet revival of your faith to go on inside of you as well. You want the light to shine in your darkness today. Well, let it shine. Welcome it. Embrace it. God wants to break into our world. God wants to enlighten our world. Let him. Allow him. Trust him.

Slide 9

### 3. For the beam of this light focuses on Jesus.

God brings revival by focusing our eyes on Jesus. Not on spirituality. Not on tradition. Not even on "the Christmas spirit." And certainly not on vague belief in God. But Jesus.

John 1 says: He is the eternal Word. He is the Light. He is God made flesh. He reveals the Father. He gives new birth. He brings grace and truth which means that Jesus is the centre of history. He is the force behind the Quiet Revival. So, God's revival has one focus: His Son.

Imagine a cloudy, smoky Australian morning. Then suddenly: One beam of sun breaks through the cloud cover. It hits a tree, a house, or a patch of ground — and everything it touches is warmed and transformed. That is how God works. He focuses the beam of heaven on Jesus — his birth, death, resurrection — & everyone who steps into that beam finds life.

Today we celebrate his birth and what a thing to celebrate. Immanuel. God is with us. God steps into our world in order to fully experience the world, understand our world. You see God is not distant, aloof, uncaring. He has come close. That is what the beam of this light tells us about Jesus. He cares. He understands. He has stepped into our shoes.

But the beam of light also focuses on Jesus' death as well. Because Jesus came to die. And it is his death that offers us the chance of eternal life. For there is something that is stopping us from fixing up our own relationship with God. And it is not the darkness of the world around us but the darkness of the world within us. We are part of the problem. I've done things wrong. I've let others down. I've haven't lived the way that God wants me to live.

But the solution to that problem is not the birth of Jesus but the death of Jesus. Where he takes on the punishment for our sins in order to gift us the reward that would be given to him for his perfect life. The beam of heaven then highlights Jesus' birth and his death and then finally his resurrection.

Because this Jesus died on the cross. Was taken to hell for the punishment that our sins deserved but on the third day he rose from the dead. He proved stronger than death. He took on Satan on his own ground and defeated him convincingly. He proved that light was stronger than darkness, that life was more powerful than death, that God had triumphed over the devil.

Slide 12

The beam of light that God is shedding into the world is focused on Jesus. His birth, yes. But also, his death and resurrection. Which means that is what God wants you to see today. Not just the food. Or the presents. Or the family. Or the fun. But Jesus. His present to you this Christmas is Jesus. Jesus' presence that can then be with you each and every day of the year.

Look at him. Walk in the light. Rejoice in the light. Receive the word. Believe in his name. See his glory. Live in his grace and truth. Be born of God. Today step into His light.

The message of Christmas is simple yet world-changing: The Light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it. The darkness around us is real, we all know that. But the Light that God offers us through his son Jesus Christ is greater. And those of us who have put our trust in Jesus know that this truth changes absolutely everything for us. The quiet revival began in Bethlehem. It is spreading quietly across Australia, the USA, England —and it can reach us today and change the world we live in tomorrow.

Slide 13

Let me finish with something that actually happened in Perth last Christmas. A small suburban café started something simple: a “Pay It Forward” board. Buy an extra coffee or meal, and they’d save it for someone doing it tough. They weren’t expecting much. Maybe a handful. Maybe one or two meals. But within days, the board was full — covered in handwritten notes from ordinary Aussies quietly giving to people they would never meet.

By Christmas Eve, they had enough prepaid meals to feed every homeless person who walked in... and then some. And do you know what happened next? People from the neighbourhood — tradies, retirees, students, mums with prams — started turning up asking, “Can I help serve?” One spark of generosity lit another. One small act of light set off a chain reaction. And that little café became a bright spot in its whole community.

That’s what Jesus does. That’s what the Light does. He enters a dark world quietly... and suddenly something begins to spread. Grace spreads. Hope spreads. Love spreads. A quiet revival begins — one heart, then another. This Christmas, the Light has come. So, step into it.

Christmas is the story of Light entering darkness — not abstract ideas, but the personal, living Light of Jesus Christ. Isaiah paints the promise. John paints its fulfilment. But you and get to walk in this light. Amidst a world full of darkness, those who put their trust in Jesus can live in the light, the light that God himself gives us in the person of Jesus Christ.
