Sermon – Soils ain't soils (Stephen T)

In 1986, Castrol GTX launched their iconic advertising slogan, "Oils Ain't Oils" The series of advertisements featured a gangster and his mechanic. The gangster wanted nothing but the best for his car and the mechanic was persuading him that the new GTX was better than anything else on the market because it was using the latest technology that had developed man-made synthetic oils.

In one of the ads, the mechanic had been kidnapped by a hypnotist, who was trying to put him into a deep trance and declare that oils was oils. But he refused. Soon after, the gangster storms in with a shovel in his hand and rescues his mechanic. He tells the hypnotist that now he is going to put him into a deep trench. You mean a deep trance, the hypnotist replied? No, a deep trench. As the ad ends with a variation on the theme, soils ain't soils.

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Which is why I have labelled Jesus' Parable of the Sower with the tag line soils ain't soils. Because the book of Matthew is about to enter into a new phase. Last week we saw that the opposition was growing from both Jesus family and the Jewish leadership and so from now on Jesus will be careful about what he says in public. He will still teach his disciples in private and prepare them for when he will leave them but for the rest he will speak only in parables.

So, what are parables? Well firstly they are

1. Stories that are taken from Real Life (verses 1-9)

Now when I say that, I am not saying they are true stories, that Jesus is recounting an actual event. Instead, they are stories about real down to earth subjects. Topics and situations that would be well known to the people of Jesus time. Parables are simple stories about seeds, plants, birds, fish and trees, that highlight a spiritual truth.

Parables are not like sermon illustrations where the preacher aims to make an abstract idea more concrete or to explain a complex issue more simply. Nor are they an allegory where every part of the story needs to be explained. Instead, parables often only have one central truth and will help us to understand one single big idea. As the listener hears what Jesus is saying in the parable and ponders it deeply, they move from being outsiders to insiders.

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Parables then are a bit like a stained-glass window. When you are inside the church and light is streaming through you get to see the picture in all of its beauty. But if you are outside at the very same time the windows are quite dull, grey and lifeless. You need to be on the inside to enjoy their story. Parables then give the crowds a chance to become one of Jesus insiders, his disciples. It also allows Jesus to fascinate his hearers without alienating them.

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So, let's have a look at our first real life story. I'm sure it will be a very familiar one to you.

"A farmer went out to sow his seed. 4 As he was scattering the seed, some fell along the path, and the birds came and ate it up. 5 Some fell on rocky places, where it did not have much soil. It sprang up quickly, because the soil was shallow. 6 But when the sun came up, the plants were scorched, and they withered because they had no root."

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7 "Other seed fell among thorns, which grew up and choked the plants. 8 Still other seed fell on good soil, where it produced a crop—a hundred, sixty or thirty times what was sown. 9 Whoever has ears, let them hear."

Now on one level that's a story about farming isn't? In those days a farmer didn't plough up the field and then plant the seed in the furrows. No, they took a bag of seed, and walked up and down his field taking fists full of the grain and throwing it everywhere, till all the ground is covered with seed with little regard to where it may fall. That's the picture here.

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Most of these seed will not produce a crop because it falls on the path or in the shallow soil or amongst the thorns. But the seed that falls on the good soil will more than make up for it. It will produce a harvest, a great harvest. Now there will be no harvest without a sower, or without the seed but the key thing is, which soil will the seed land in? Because soils ain't soils. The crop will only grow when the grain is sowed into the good soil.

Now you can imagine that when the people first heard that parable, they might have wondered what the point of Jesus teaching was? Is he telling them to be careful where I plant my seeds next spring? Duh. That's pretty obvious, isn't it? Not really worth travelling miles in the heat of the day to hear Captain Obvious teach me a Sunday School lesson. So, for many they would scratch their heads and go home. But notice some actually push back.

10 "The disciples came to him and asked, "Why do you speak to the people in parables?" You see the parable is one way that Jesus sifts out his hearers. Some will listen. Others will truly hear and others will miss the point completely. And isn't that still true of people today?

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The story is told of William Wilberforce, the man who introduced the first anti-slavery legislation into the British parliament, one day brought his non-Christian friend, the Prime Minister, William Pitt, to hear one of the greatest evangelical preachers in London, a man called Richard Cecil. Well, that Sunday Cecil delivered a truly great sermon – Biblical, eloquent, passionate, forceful and clear. And Wilberforce was thrilled with the preaching.

As they walked away, Wilberforce asked Pitt what he thought? "You know Wilberforce, I haven't the slightest idea what that man was talking about." And Jesus parables are a bit like that, because not only are they real, but at times they will also

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2. Conceal (verses 11-15)

11 "He (Jesus) replied, "Because the knowledge of the secrets of the kingdom of heaven has been given to you, but not to them. 12 Whoever has will be given more, and they will have an abundance. Whoever does not have, even what they have will be taken from them."

For parables are not simple stories to make difficult concepts much easier to understand, they will reveal its deep, spiritual truths to some and conceal them from others.

Look back at how this parable starts and ends. Jesus begins in verse 3 with the call to "*listen*," and concludes in verse 9, "*let him who has ears to hear, let him hear*." This is not just about farming. There's a hidden layer of meaning to this. And some will get it & some won't.

Jesus says the knowledge of the kingdom of heaven has been given just to the disciples and not to the crowds. But it's the exact same teaching! But one will take what they already know and add to it and the other will take their ignorance and add to that as well. That is the point of why Jesus is teaching in parables. *"Though seeing, they do not see; though hearing, they do not hear or understand."*

One of the tasks of the parable is to conceal the truth to those who don't want to look for the truth. In a way it is a bit like Isaiah's prophecy. Isaiah proclaimed the good news, some of the most amazing prophecies in the OT, just before the nation of Israel went into exile. Just before they faced the awful judgement of having their king humbled, their temple destroyed, their priests and leaders deported and their land trashed.

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Into that context Isaiah is called to tell people God's word. But as God's people hear God's word, we find out that *"You will be ever hearing but never understanding; you will be ever seeing but never perceiving. 15 For this people's heart has become calloused; they hardly hear with their ears, and they have closed their eyes. Otherwise, they might see with their eyes, hear with their ears, understand with their hearts and turn, and I would heal them."*

Isaiah's hearers didn't want to hear. They don't want to see, what God is doing among them. Their hearts are hard, calloused even! So, the message goes in one ear and out the other, giving them no excuse. They can't say they were not warned. They can't say God didn't give them one last chance. And so, because they didn't really hear what Isaiah was saying, his message condemns them. They are blowing their last chance. And now the people of Jesus time are in exactly the same situation. They hear but they don't have ears to really hear. These parables are concealing the truth from them rather than revealing the truth to them.

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The apostle Paul says something similar in 1 Corinthians 2:14, *"The man without the Spirit does not accept the things that come from the Spirit of God, for they are foolishness to him and he cannot understand them because they are spiritually discerned."* To understand Jesus teaching you need the Spirit. You need Jesus' help to give you sight and let you to hear and to change your heart. And isn't that what we have seen Jesus do for people these past few chapters of Matthew? He wants to do that for people but the seed has to fall in the right soil. Soils ain't soils. Spiritual growth only comes when the seed lands in good soil. Then it

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3. Reveals (verses 16-23)

16 "But blessed are your eyes because they see & your ears because they hear. 17 For truly I tell you, many prophets & righteous people longed to see what you see but did not see it, and to hear what you hear but did not hear it."

The knowledge of the secrets of the Kingdom of God are available to those who have ears to hear. Those who are willing to push back and ask for wisdom from Jesus. Those who have invited God's Holy Spirit within them. Those who have received a heart transplant and got rid of their old hard heart and replaced it with one that is open to the things of God.

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So rather than just a nice agricultural story, Jesus is telling us about the hearts of all mankind. And which ones will be fruitful and whose lives will be fruitless. *18 "Listen then to what the parable of the sower means: 19 When anyone hears the message about the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what was sown in their heart. This is the seed sown along the path."*

Jesus is the sower & right now he is spreading the seed, the good news to people far & wide. Not just in Palestine in 30AD but to Lake Macquarie in 2025. And that seed will land on four soils, which represent four different types of hearts. You see soils ain't soils. Depending upon what sort of soil your heart represents, depends upon how much spiritual growth there is.

Now if the seed lands on a stony path, it is not going to make one iota of difference. The word of God comes to some who just don't understand it. It makes no sense to them. It's pie in the sky when you die. It isn't as important as making money, making friends, making the most of this life and so the message doesn't penetrate into that person's life. And so, the seed is vulnerable to Satan coming and snatching it away.

You see there are two things going on here. The person is not open to considering spiritual things and Satan doesn't want to give them a chance to change their mind. And the result? No crop. No growth. Not a revealing of their true state before God but a concealing of the fact that Satan not God, is the one pulling the strings in this person's life.

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A stony heart and then there is the superficial heart. 20 *"The seed falling on rocky ground refers to someone who hears the word and at once receives it with joy. 21 But since they have no root, they last only a short time. When trouble or persecution comes because of the word, they quickly fall away."* The word of God comes to this second type of person and there is an initial response. A joyful response. But it's short-lived response.

Because when trouble or persecution comes their way, the roots haven't been able to go deep enough into their lives. They haven't counted the cost. Maybe it had been easy believism, just come down the front & your sins and problems will be gone. And they aren't. Or maybe we have sent our young people to a youth group with their friends that is more social than spiritual. Or maybe we show an initial interest in Jesus but our family and work cranks up and we take our eyes off Him & put them onto ourselves & walk away from Jesus.

George Whitfield, the great English evangelist of the 18-century used to preach to massive crowds many of whom came forward after his sermons to give their lives to Jesus. Often, he was asked how many people were saved and he would say, I'm not sure. We will find out in a few years' time.

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There are the stony hearts, superficial hearts and then thirdly stifled hearts. 22 *"The seed falling among the thorns refers to someone who hears the word, but the worries of this life and the deceitfulness of wealth choke the word, making it unfruitful."* The word produces growth and that growth might last many years but worry and money take over and stifle or strangle any such growth and choke the producing of any fruit.

Our credit cards control us, or our internet shopping or gaming, or pornography, or ambition, or Sunday sport, or the children's education, or one of a million other things comes between you and the sun. And so, no growth happens.

Do you see what Jesus is revealing to us here? Satan, suffering and stuff will often work against any form of spiritual growth. And so, if these things are creeping into our lives, we need to be careful, incredibly careful. Get rid of anything that is coming in the way of your relationship with Jesus. Ask God to unhardens your heart, to destrangle your heart, to deepen your heart and to lastly to make sure you have a successful heart.

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23 *"But the seed falling on good soil refers to someone who hears the word & understands it. This is the one who produces a crop, yielding a hundred, sixty or thirty times what was sown"* The sign of a good heart is that there will be spiritual growth coming from that source. Love for God will be growing. The fruits of the spirit will be growing. Love for others will be growing. For this is saying that if the word of God is placed in the right environment there will always be growth.

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Now in those days the average yield of field was about 8 times what was sowed but when God's seed does its work there be a superabundant harvest. Not 8 times but 30 times or 50- times or even 100 times what was planted. For all Christians bear fruit, some a lot, others a lot more and others still an awful lot more. That's the power in the seed. The good news will make a difference in your life.

So, the call is to welcome the word immediately. To make sure that it is placed within your heart deeply. And make sure nothing else is given such exclusive access. The word, the bible, Jesus is the one who has to be planted in the very centre of our lives. And he promises if we do that, you and I will thrive.

Now let me tell you how this parable rings true in the life of my family. In a way my Mum is like the seed on the path. Hardened to the things of God. When I talk to her about Jesus you get nowhere. It doesn't mean that God may not crack open her heart sometime in the future but for all my life the word of God has been given no chance to thrive in her life.

And then there is my younger brother, in his late teens and early twenties, he came to Church, led a bible study group even and was filled with joy for Jesus but then peer pressure, job pressures and marrying a Catholic bit by bit caused him to move away from Jesus. I still have hope for him but it does seem at this stage he had a superficial heart.

Then there was my Dad, brought up in Church, a methodist lay preacher who married my mum and one day had to make a choice between Church and family. And chose his family. Which gave me a stable home and a secure upbringing at the cost of his relationship with the Lord. He had a strangled heart. And lastly there is my cousin whose gone through many highs and lows in her life but is still producing a crop of spiritual fruit. She's the fourth soil.

The same gospel. The same word of God but different responses. Depending upon the state of their heart. So, what is the state of your heart? Is it faithless and stubborn? Shallow and Shaky? Worried and worldly or faithful and fruitful? That's not something that I can judge for you. But it is something you can take to the Lord in prayer.

Plead with him to reveal the truth. Ask him to show you the fruit. Call on him to soften your heart. And prepare yourself for when Satan wants to snatch the gospel away from you, when suffering will take the joy away from you and when stuff will squeeze the life out of you. So that no matter what the world, the flesh and the devil throw at you, your heart will continue to produce a fruitful, God honouring crop.

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4. Parables Heal (Verse 15)

Hear again the challenge of verses 15. Be a person *who "might see with their eyes, hear with their ears, & understand with their hearts."* Allow Jesus to affect what you see and what you look at. Ask him to enable you to hear the voice of God calling you at each and every moment. And that he was give us all spiritual understanding around what God is doing in our hearts, our minds and our bodies.

For then, when we *"turn, he will heal us."* Not conceal things from us but reveal the truth in us and bring about the healing we all need. Healing of body, mind and soul.

In the meantime, the call of the parable is to keep sowing the seed. Spread the word. In every direction. We know that not everyone will respond but that those with a good heart will come into the kingdom. And so, we sow the seed, day in and day out. And whether it looks like it is effective or not, God will bring the growth. God is responsible for the growth. God promises that there will be growth. So, we leave the growth completely in his hands.

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What is in our hands though, is how we respond to this parable. In Matthew 13 we are told 19 times to hear. Hear what God is saying to us today. For e.g. Matthew 13:9 *"Whoever has ear, let him hear."* We have the chance not just to listen but to hear what Jesus is saying to us. Make sure that our ears are connected to our heart & so it changes our inner most being.

But do you know this parable is the only parable that appears in Matthew, Mark and Luke. And Mark ends this parable with the challenge, *"take heed **what you hear.**"* What are you listening to at the moment? Your own inner thoughts and struggles? The needs of the people around you? Or God's voice? What you hear is really, very important.

And in Lukes gospel the call is to *"Take heed... **how you hear.**"* There is a good way to hear and a bad way. So concentrate hard. Take notes. Discuss it in a Bible Study. Apply it to your own life. Reflect on the passage again towards the end of the week to see if it has made any difference. Hear. Heed what you hear and how you hear.

Because a tiny seed of the gospel can bring about superabundant growth in our hearts and lives. A small step of faith can have amazing consequences to the people around you. A simple sowing of this seed could bring others into the kingdom. Let God do his work to bring in his kingdom. And let us respond by hearing and obeying the word given to us today.
