SERMON

Does anyone know what is happening in the US next Tuesday? There is a massive 'bun fight' going on over there as they prepare to elect a president. A few years ago a political commentator in the USA made the observation that "any American who is prepared to run for President should automatically, by definition, be disqualified from ever doing so!"

If we take the time to reflect on the passage from Matthew's Gospel this morning we might sometimes think that Jesus would agree with that commentator's perception of power in the US. Jesus does not hold back in his attacks on power and how it is abused. I sometimes wonder if we really take the time to reflect on the damage that the abuse of power can cause.

In the political arena we so often hear one side attacking the other over their abuse of power. They suggest that power has gone to their opponent's head or that they are just using their power to further their own personal needs. In recent times there has been little said about how to use power for the right reasons.

I don't think that power in itself is necessarily a bad thing. It can be used for good. As Australians we all have a hefty dose of anti-authoritarian scepticism as part of our cultural psyche when it comes to power.

Talking with people who have lived in the USA it seems to me that as a nation they have a much greater reverence for power than we do in Australia. For them symbols of power like their flag and the trappings of the presidential office seem to carry an inordinate amount of reverence, regardless of which president is in power.

Here in Australia we still have debates from time to time about changing our flag. We have a tendency to cut down 'tall poppies', especially politicians. Politics here is considered to be a necessary but tiresome part of life. Reporters make a great deal of fuss about what happens almost daily in parliament but what happened last week soon seems to be forgotten.

In Biblical terms we can see that power is not intrinsically evil as it is one thing that God exercises. We readily associate the term 'power' with aspects of God, like the Holy Spirit. But how often have we heard that something occurred under the 'power of the Holy Spirit?'

As this description of an aspect of God has been abused so times we seem to be wary of the term. In the passage today Jesus points out that there was misuse and flaunting of power in front of him that day. This pattern has continued down through the ages.

So often power is treated as an end in itself rather than a means to support and encourage people. This is equally a problem in both democratic and

totalitarian systems. Just recently here is NSW we have had a very public airing of the machinations of a discredited politician who apparently abused his power to gain wealth for himself regardless of who he deceived. I am sure that we can all add to this list from both here and around the world. Politicians also try to manipulate power in order to stay in office for as long as possible, often well past their use by date!

Human based power structures seem to need to maintain their image and appearance in order to survive. In Jesus' words from Matthew's Gospel today we hear: "They love to have the place of honour at banquets and the best seats in the synagogues, and to be greeted with respect in the marketplaces, and to have people address them with impressive titles." Jesus is clearly confronting the abuse of power which seeks to just perpetuate itself.

Come our election days we are challenged with displays of power by opposing teams. We tend to go with the team which appears the strongest. They all say that only they have the correct answers to every the problem that they can think of. We get this in cycles of 3 to 4 years.

Power equally has to be confronted when there is abuse. Just think back over the last few years as we found out more and more about the abuse of sexual power in both government and church institutions as it was publicly laid bare in a Royal Commission. All parts of society can be corrupted by the abuse of power.

The point that Jesus is making is that there can be good power.

- * Power that is not just exercised for its own sake.
- * Power which does not need to be projected as image and window dressing.

None of us doubt that Jesus was a powerful person. Even the rulers of his day were wary of him. At the time of his birth we have the Bible story that King Herod sought to have Jesus eliminated. The threat which led Him to the cross was that the rulers and those in power were unable to control Him for their own desires so as to keep their power.

Jesus concept of power is orientated towards empowering and helping to support those who are currently powerless. He does not need to do anything to maintain his power as He is the source of power. The sorts of people that God seeks to empower are generally referred to in the Bible as: 'The widows, orphans, the refugees and the poor.' These sorts of people are very so often exploited by greedy and ruthless power-hungry people.

Good power, as described by Jesus, has virtually the opposite outcome to the power-hungry abusers. It is in this light that we can come to talk about a God of both power and might. So often in our world power is symbolised by violence, the power to hold people in prison, the power to dismiss people from their job, the power to withhold love and support. These are all aspects of that violence.

The only violence in the power that Jesus demonstrates is His power to

suffer with those who are suffering. Jesus is not one to counter violence with more violence. Jesus is the Prince of Peace who demonstrates that genuine peace is not achieved by superior violence. Instead He stands in the way of violence and absorbs the abuse. Therefore He refuses to perpetuate violence through fighting back physically. His response is love and forgiveness which breaks that horrific cycle of abuse and violence

This is where Jesus' message is so powerful, the power of God. The idea that God is some ultimate violent threat promising eternal torture does God a great disservice. In the life and death of Jesus we come to learn of God's true nature. It is the power to give without limit, to lift up those who have been oppressed, the strength to absorb the worst that power hungry forces can deliver and then to still give new life. The power to still share graceful love with forgiveness and new life even when death seems to reign.

In the revelation given to us by Christ through his life and ministry we are shown the correct way power should be exercised. Jesus said that we should follow his teachings, not the actions of the rulers of his day as they did not practice what God taught.

No matter how much we feel that we have learned in life we need to constantly reflect and keep learning how to exercise the pure power of love and grace as shown to us by Jesus.

In a time where there are so many different interpretations of power and authority being displayed throughout the world we need to come back to Jesus' simple message.

"The greatest among you will be your servant. All who exalt themselves will be humbled, and all who humble themselves will be exalted."
