READINGS

Isaiah 64:1-9

O that you would tear open the heavens and come down,

so that the mountains would quake at your presence—

2 as when fire kindles brushwood

and the fire causes water to boil-

to make your name known to your adversaries,

- so that the nations might tremble at your presence!
- 3 When you did awesome deeds that we did not expect, you came down, the mountains quaked at your presence.
- 4 From ages past no one has heard, no ear has perceived,
- no eye has seen any God besides you, who works for those who wait for him.
- 5 You meet those who gladly do right, those who remember you in your ways.
- But you were angry, and we sinned; because you hid yourself we transgressed.

SERMON

Well, it's so good to be back with you after the last few weeks. Surgery is never fun and having one arm out of action is very frustrating. I still can't drive.

It is interesting to me that this week marks the start of the four Sundays leading up to Christmas Day. Yes, it is that close! We call this time Advent. In terms of the liturgical year it is the start of a New Year! So, Happy New Year!

Consequently we start out the series of themes running through this season this week with Hope! In this respect the passages from both the Old Testament and Mark look at trying to find hope in the midst of chaos.

The last year has certainly brought us a massive dose of chaos. At this time last year, after a long drought, we were entering into perhaps one of the worst fire

seasons in a generation. During that time the skies turned grey and even black and red in places as massive bush fires burned. These fires seemingly defying any form of control by our desperate fireys.

At the same time in China a person caught what was thought to be a cold which has now spread across the whole world. Thousands upon thousands have died. I am sure that we will never know the full death toll, let alone the suffering of those who have caught COVID 19.

At the same time there have been terror attacks across the world, especially in the Middle East and parts of northern Africa.

In the last week or so we have had horrifying reports of blatant murder by Australian Special Forces troops. At the same time the rate of domestic violence doesn't seem to diminish no matter what is done by authorities.

As we come to the end of yet another year, people might be forgiven for thinking that there is no hope. The light at the end of the tunnel has been switched off. It just seems that there is one disaster after another.

In today's readings Isaiah calls down judgement and devastation on a nation which has wandered far from the Ways of the Lord, as he calls it, and he is calling his people to return to God's ways.

At the same time Mark has us reflecting on the mind numbing chaos that he sees as the start of the end of time. Whenever there is a period of escalating disruptions and life changing events many people start to wonder if the world is coming to an end. They wonder if this is what Jesus was warning about in this passage from Mark.

Things seem to be bubbling along nicely then it appears that it all starts to fall apart. What was normal is now a distant memory. The reality which we were comfortable with has now become a grind which keeps us apart, demolished massive parts of our environment and then it starts to kill off people around us.

It was only about 18 years ago that there was a series of planes which were flown into some high rise buildings in the US. Chaos in our world is nothing new. Different things seem to keep cropping up to disrupt our lives over time.

The reason that things seem to be getting to the point that we are worried about the end-of-the-world is that we have not experienced this exact same combination before. However we constantly face massive challenges the same as humanity has done since time began.

The message from Mark is categorised as apocalyptic, that is at the end of time when everything starts falling apart, possibly heralding the second coming.

These sorts of premonitions and movements were not uncommon in Jesus time and before. We seem to have had more than our fair share around the end of last century when we approached the year 2000.

It is very difficult to discern real warnings of troubles ahead from the hyperbole of those who are just panicking over what turns out to be virtually nothing.

When the world seems completely disrupted and our daily lives are shaken by constant rule changes we all tend to feel that the bottom has fallen out of our world. We can start to use overly dramatic and extreme language to try and describe the situation that we have found ourselves in. It is like the sun has refused to shine, the earth is shaking and reality has been turned on its head.

When we read an apocalyptic passage from the Bible we might not be completely aware of the situation being experienced by the author whose experience gave rise to those words at that time.

- Was it a tribal conflict or a full-on battle?
- Was there an earthquake and some meteor shower at the same time?

When the author of Mark recorded the words that we heard this morning there was a very special context. Whatever Jesus had said was viewed in the light of the fact that the Roman Army had just sacked Jerusalem after an uprising about a statue of Caesar being forcefully put into the Temple. The Temple had been demolished in the heat of that conflict.

For Jews the Temple had become the heart of Judaism and that destruction felt like a death blow to the faith, this mood also reflected onto the fledgling Christian church. This mood of despair brought to the fore the words spoken by Jesus foreshadowing events like they were living through.

So how do we approach this passage? We could always take the emu approach and put our heads in the sand and say that those events have long since passed. Therefore we could ignore the message.

We could equally say that the first century believers were mistaken so therefore the second coming is still ahead of us.

Alternatively we could look at the passage as not just referring to a single event seeing that it spoke of a time beyond the sacking of the Temple knowing that disasters and destruction are part of the world we live in.

Personally I am more inclined to the last approach. We live in a world where there are disasters and human conflicts. It is comforting to me to comprehend that Jesus knew this and reminded us that day does follow night.

So what do I think Jesus trying to share with us with this passage?

Jesus not only knew that throughout history that there had been disasters and pain. He equally knew that it would continue and his message might even contribute to the conflict at times. In Matthew 10:34 Jesus says: "Do not think that I have come to bring peace to the earth; I have not come to bring peace, but a sword." It is not that Jesus is seeking violence but that it was a probable outcome of his message.

Let me expand on this concept a bit. We all know the terrible toll that the supposed wonder drug Thalidomide took when it was introduced in the 1950's and 1960's. It was a very powerful tool in combating debilitating symptoms for those poor women suffering morning sickness during pregnancy. Later analysis showed that more than 10,000 babies suffered from deformities from that drug.

Once that problem became known there was no way people would take that drug, no matter how sick they felt. The scientist who led the discovery of this situation could have been seen as the saviour of many babies who have subsequently not suffered from deformity but at the same time so many women were now put back into the situation where they suffered terribly from morning sickness.

While some of you might think that this is a strange analogy to use it also highlights that Jesus fundamental message highlights the truth that the world is full of chaos and violence. The Gospel contributes to the unmasking of apocalyptic situations where previously the truth had not been able to seen through all the other confusion in the world.

In reality through the message given to us from Jesus and the nature of His sacrificial death means that we do have a formula to address this conundrum. The only way to address the violence and chaos of the world is through utilising good to overcome the effects of violence and disasters.

The ability to suppress the evil of conflict comes from people who prevent violence. As we contain violence and the resulting chaos, apocalypse can be avoided. In the turmoil around Jesus the community at the time called out "Crucify Him. Crucify Him." But Jesus did not stay dead, and he came back with love and forgiveness.

From this we can see that vengeful violence and disruption is just our human failure to reconcile. There is no need for vengeance.

Ever since Jesus' resurrection we have been slowly discovering that violence is not the way forward.

"They" are not the bad ones we once thought. In recent times we have come to realise that we should not condemn people for the colour of their skin, or because a woman chose to become a recluse away from society's trauma. We don't need to combine to attack a person of colour or a person who we might have once considered a witch.

The Gospel message is that we need to open our eyes and not always demonise outsiders, like asylum seekers and marginalized minorities. We need to understand the humanity of victims, not objectify them. Jesus keeps whispering to us saying: "When you do that to one of the least of these, you are doing it to me."

Like the Thalidomide analogy we have to keep discerning so that our cure is not creating more problems than we are seeking to solve. The resolution that Jesus offers comes out of mutual love and grace. Even in the most terrifying of times. Violence is never a lasting answer.

When we boil this passage down it simply says that there are no simplistic answers. "Read the signs. Stay awake. Be prepared to adjust and adapt to a constantly changing world." Fires, drought, pandemics and worldwide chaos have no answer to Jesus constant message.

Salvation does not come in the form of some new weapon designed to destroy life. Salvation comes in the world working together to deploy its gifts to meet and overcome the things that disrupt us.

- Like a pandemic.
- Like an earthquake or cyclonic winds.

Salvation comes in the form of a baby boy born in a cattle shed. A baby so powerful that the authorities could not destroy Him. This baby keeps calling to us to stay awake to "Read the Signs." All the innocent victims are connected whether they be from violence or from a disease. There is no need for collateral damage.

We need to stay awake to proclaim that Baby and the message of hope in the middle of disaster, drought, pandemic or whatever else comes our way.

2020 CHRISTMAS CAROL.

While listening to ABC Classic FM I heard about a new Australian Christmas Carol – "Christmas with You" written by an Aboriginal lady – Deborah Cheetham. She wrote a carol for 2020 – the year of loss and separation around the world – the longing to be with those we love.

These are the words of the first verse.

"Can you find your way home Christmas Night?

There is a star to guide you

It shines with the light I hold in my heart

O can you find your home Christmas Night"

As an illustration Deanne Gilson has produced aboriginal artwork depicting the Morning Star – when the star is overhead it is said to bring news and hope of the cycle of life, death and new beginnings. We Christians can add the story of the Light from the Star bringing worshippers to the infant Jesus – God's Son.

This carol is to be sung by an Inaugural Classic Choir – it has online rehearsals for anyone wishing to sing – when the singer is ready he or she must submit a video of singing the Carol – every video will be included in the final film – ready for Christmas.

"From the toughest adversity we create finest beauty."

Why do we sing? – It's the core of our being used in communication and ceremonies throughout human history.

Singing has marvellous benefits for body mind and spirit. Participants in choirs speak of a "wonderful feeling" surrounded by and connected to others – it reduces stress, anxiety and depression.

Singers get a hit of body chemicals which support better mental health and immune function.

Research in Sweden showed that when choristers began to sing their heart rates slowed and blood pressure lowered – then their heartbeats became synchronised. In some churches prayers and psalms are sung or chanted.

Let us read the Lord's Prayer together now as a song in our hearts.

Our Father in heaven,

hallowed be your name,

your kingdom come,

your will be done,

on earth as in heaven.

Give us today our daily bread.

Forgive us our sins,

as we forgive those who sin against us.

Save us from the time of trial

and deliver us from evil.

For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours now and for ever. Amen.
